## FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dads and Grads. That is what we hear so much of as we begin our June journey. My focus this month is about Dads or rather, Fathers.

I *had* a father. You all had a father too. We all have our stories. Some stories may not be pleasant. I'm sorry if your father's story is not memorable or kind. Others? Others have stories that are as amazing as the sun rising and setting every day.

I was lucky enough to have an amazing Father. My *father* had an amazing father. But that's another story.

How did Father's Day come to be? I would like to share with you a bit of history about it. And then, share some of my thoughts on Father's Day.

Father's Day was first celebrated in the U.S. in 1910, the year my father's father was born. The first Father's Day was inspired by Sonora Smart Dodd of Spokane, Washington, who was raised by a widowed Civil War veteran. While initially met with resistance or seen as a commercial gimmick, the day gained steady traction, officially becoming a permanent U.S. federal holiday in 1972.

The journey to establishing Father's Day was gradual and evolved over several decades:

- **The First Gathering (1908):** The earliest documented service honoring fathers occurred in Fairmont, West Virginia, on July 5, 1908. It was organized by Grace Golden Clayton to honor 362 men (many of them fathers) who had died in the Monongah mining disaster months prior.
- **Sonora Smart Dodd's Campaign (1910):** Inspired by the recently established Mother's Day, Dodd wanted to honor her father, William Jackson Smart, who single-handedly raised her and her five siblings. Thanks to her efforts, Washington State celebrated the nation's first statewide Father's Day on June 19, 1910.
- **Early Resistance:** Initially, many men scoffed at the holiday, viewing it as an attempt to "domesticate" them with flowers and cards, or simply as a retail gimmick.
- **Presidential Endorsements:** President Woodrow Wilson supported the concept in 1916, and President Calvin Coolidge urged states to observe it in 1924. However, it wasn't until 1956 that Congress officially passed a joint resolution recognizing the day.
- **Official Federal Holiday (1972):** In 1966, President Lyndon B. Johnson issued the first presidential proclamation establishing the third Sunday in June as Father's Day. It was finally signed into law as a permanent national holiday by President Richard Nixon in 1972.

That is the history of Father's Day based on my research. But that isn't *my* history Father's Day.

My Father's Day story is about a man who loved his three children so much he fought

to have them taken and placed into foster care. Foster care because his wife, my mother, was so wracked with mental illness the county wanted to have me and my two sisters placed into foster care. My dad fought and proved he could care and provide for us, but that mostly, that he loved us.

My father did all the laundry, grocery shopping and cooking. He coached little league and girls' softball. He saw to it that I had new Adidas track shoes for my track and field efforts, new gloves for my sister's softball seasons.

My dad did it all! I never heard my dad say an ill word toward my mother or us children. We knew we were loved. I *knew* my father loved me. A big hug and a kiss goodnight were always in order.

It wasn't until I was older that I realized and understood the sacrifices my father had made to be a dad. My Dad was my best friend. I miss my Dad. He's been gone eleven years now. He would have just had his 89<sup>th</sup> birthday. His birth date is tattooed on the inside of my middle finger, "26<sup>th</sup> of May". I had it etched on the same finger Dad lost in an accident.

I won't spend anymore time lamenting over my father with you but, oh how I could though.

Find the time this month to recall a good thought of your father. If he is still with you honor him with a phone call or a visit.

My Dad taught me that being honored as a father can have the greatest feeling. I'm recalling the phone call I might get on a Father's Day from my Dad, honoring me as a Father. That was pure Love on his part. How I miss those calls.

**Happy Father's Day.**

## FATHER'S DAY

The first event recorded in the United States honoring fathers was held on July 5, 1908 in a West Virginia church to honor the hundreds of men who died in a coal mine explosion. It was a one-time commemoration and not an annual holiday.

The next year, Sonora Smart Dodd, the daughter of a widower who raised his six children as a single dad in Spokane, Washington, began to work for the equivalent of Mother's Day for male parents. With the help of local churches, the YMCA, and shopkeepers and government officials she worked to generate support for her idea. Her effort

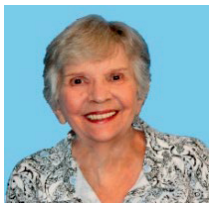


was successful when Washington state celebrated the nation's first statewide Father's Day on June 19, 1910.

The movement for Father's Day was honored by President Wilson in 1816 when from Washington, DC he pressed a button to telegraph signals to unfurl a flag in Spokane. By 1924, President Calvin Coolidge urged state governments to observe Father's Day. In 1966, President Lyndon Johnson signed a presidential proclamation declaring that the third Sunday of June 1966 be recognized as Father's Day. It would take six more years before President Richard Nixon established Father's Day as a permanent national holiday to be observed on the third Sunday of June every year.

**OUR SHREDDING EVENT is COMING to LAKEVIEW THIS SUMMER...**

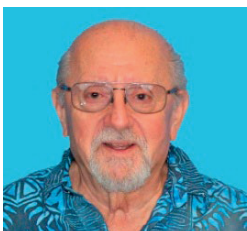
Our very popular **SHREDDING EVENT** will be back here in Lakeview Village in June. Many of you have been asking about this every other year event.

It’s June, and somehow, I keep wondering how a half-year passed by without notice and

forbid, how much faster the rest of the year will go by! Somehow, I can remember so much about those years when the world was much slower than today. I always thought getting older would be the time when things slowed down, haha, right! Right now, I’d better be thinking about what beverages Shenanigans should be offering in June. There is the B-Side Band dinner dance on **June 13<sup>th</sup>** and a regular **Happy2Hours on the 27<sup>th</sup>** of the month to deal with.

For the B-Side Dance, we will offer Sangria Spritzers, it’s tasty and refreshing as well. It might be a hot afternoon, something cool would be just the right choice for the day. For the 27<sup>th</sup> Happy2Hours I was thinking about Frozen Strawberry Daiquiris. Our Margarita machine makes great daiquiris just as well. Besides it’s summertime and a slushy cold beverage would be perfect. Now I need to convince Mr. & Mrs. Margaritaville to switch over to daiquiri production; maybe if I ask them real nice?

A thought or two about making Sangria Spritzers at home without a lot of work and/or preparation on your part. We found out that Costco’s Kirkland Sangria imported from Spain is very tasty just out of the bottle, however, you can take it a step further and make it even tastier. You can add fresh citrus fruit to a pitcher and then pour the bottle sangria over the fruit a few days before to let it marinate well. We found out that too many lemons and limes can change the taste too much if you are not careful. Please be sure to wash all fruit well before adding the sangria wine.

For a gallon pitcher of Sangria, add the following: Two navel oranges, one seedless lemon, and two limes all cut into ring slices. Pour the sangria over the fruit, cover to seal out air, and let it marinate for a couple of days, or at least a few hours. If you plan to

keep the sangria for several days in the refrigerator, remove the fresh fruit before the citrus rinds add too much bitterness. To make the sangria into a bubbly beverage we like to use Canada Dry Ginger Ale. It is the best flavor combination we have found. Actually, since the recipe is so simple, I would only make as much sangria as I would use in three or four days, and I'd leave the fruit in the pitcher with the wine.

### **Behind this month's cover design.**

This month's cover was a joy to create, although it isn't exactly what I had in mind at first thought. I remembered an old sepia colored photograph of my Great Grandmother and her two young daughters, my dad's mom and aunt, dressed in their 1900's beach attire against a painted backdrop of a beach scene. Unfortunately, that photo was buried someplace in a box of old family photos in the garage. I was not motivated to search through many boxes of old photos, I could dream up a close scenario instead. There was only one problem, and it was not finding suitable images of people in swim costumes, the problem was everything I found was in black and white, and I wanted to create my painting in the colors of the period. So, a simple google search online for colors and patterns from the 1860's was needed. That is how I chose the colors and patterns used in this painting.

It was important that the girls I chose to paint looked happy but concerned about getting their beach costumes wet. I found a suitable reference photograph to use for my painting and now all I needed to do was create the surf for them to enjoy. I painted a little sailboat to advertise a coming dinner dance event. It took more time to research my idea for the painting than I counted upon, however, I do believe it was worth the extra time; I hope you think so as well.

### **From Diane's Kitchen**

I've shared this recipe before, but I was asked to share it again. I hope you enjoy it.

### **Cinco de Mayo Refried Beans**

#### **Ingredients**

- 1 can Rosarita vegetarian refried beans 6-1/2 lb. can
- 2 cups restaurant style medium chunky salsa
- 3 cups sour cream
- 4 cups shredded cheddar cheese
- 3 tablespoons taco seasoning
- 2 tablespoons ground cumin
- 1 cup chopped green chilis

#### **Directions**

Put 1/3 can of beans, 1-1/2 cups sour cream, 2 cups cheddar cheese, 3 tablespoons taco seasoning, and 2 tablespoons cumin in a food processor and process until smooth. Put the rest of the beans in a large bowl and mash them up. Add the processed beans and mix. Add 2 cups of salsa, 2 cups cheese, 1 cup green chilis, and 1-1/2 cups of sour cream. Mix until well blended. Adjust seasoning and add more of remaining ingredients if needed. Place in baking pans and heat in a 350-degree oven until hot.

Some items have recently disappeared from the kitchen. I haven't been able to find 6 tall plastic pitchers and 1 woven napkin basket. All the equipment is for use in the clubhouse and kitchen area. Nothing is to be borrowed for use away from these areas.

**UPDATE ON SECURITY IMPROVEMENTS**

I spoke with Doug Grass on Tuesday, May 12<sup>th</sup>. He has managed our park since 2005, and is retiring at the end of June.

He has been working on some of the security upgrades we requested and passed our proposals along to his replacement with whom I will continue our dialogue.

There is some encouraging news about what will happen shortly:

1. Internet connection will be provided at both park entrances. New cameras will provide real-time feeds and memory storage that monitor all activity.
2. Each person renting space in the RV park will receive an individualized code so that every gate opening is traceable to their account. This will discourage space renters from sharing their code and make entry much more challenging for intruders.
3. Additionally, he said significant paving improvements will occur this summer.

I thanked him for his years of service to the park and for the noted upcoming improvements. I also let him know that we are eager to work with the new manager to pursue some of the other improvements we requested.

**ABOUT TRESPASSERS TO OUR VILLAGE (repeated from May Crier)**



As some of you are quite aware, we often have uninvited visitors to the park who come to fish or for other reasons. Some of them are polite when told they are not allowed to be here and they leave, while others are rude or even threatening.

I have been in communication with Officer Taylor at the Citrus Heights Police Department about the situation and how we should handle it. Officer Taylor assured me

that they definitely will support us in seeing our neighborhood and the lake area better secured. **There are new protocols for us to follow when dealing with non-residents on the property.**

Rather than using the 911 phone number we have been using, we are to **call the CHPD non-emergency number and say that you are in Lakeview Village and describe whom you see that appears to be a trespasser and what they are doing. Call (916) 727-5500**

Additionally, if you are comfortable and feel safe approaching the person you might take their picture, or video a brief conversation in which you politely inform them that the entire park is private property and their presence constitutes trespassing. Furthermore, the Citrus Heights Police Department is responsible for policing the area and ensuring repeated trespassers are dealt with according to the law. If you get a picture, please email the video/picture to me at [dcoller58@gmail.com](mailto:dcoller58@gmail.com) and I will save the evidence to share with the CDPH if the intruder returns.

**The following information is directly from the Citrus Heights Police Department website and provides a clearer picture of how they approach the situation.** Additionally, Officer Taylor strongly advised me not to worry about bothering their department, emphasizing that they want to proactively address the issue with us to solve the chronic problem. We need not and should not “tangle” with offenders, but our documenting of repeated offenders can lead to substantial repercussions for them from the police department.

**The Citrus Heights Police Department non-emergency number is (916) 727-5500. This line is available 24 hours a**

**day, 7 days a week for reporting non-urgent incidents, such as suspicious activity, noise complaints, or past-tense crimes where there is no immediate threat to life or property.**

### **Trespassing Enforcement**

Illegal camping, loitering, and illegal dumping on private property qualify as trespassing. The Citrus Heights Police Department enforces trespassing; below is a description of the enforcement and noticing process:

### **DIRECT CHPD ASSISTANCE WITH TRESPASSING**

- Call the Citrus Heights Police Department (CHPD) and ask for an individual to be issued a written trespass warning.
- If a merchant who calls CHPD to have an officer respond to a trespass issue needs to leave before the officers arrive on the scene, the merchant can ask the dispatcher who takes the call to have the officer contact them at the conclusion of the call to provide the merchant with a disposition of what happened.

### **PRIVATE SECURITY OPTION WITH TRESPASSING**

- Property owners and merchants may call their local private security company for trespassing issue assistance
- Private security can issue the forms to individuals while on duty (Please contact CHPD for trespass forms pursuant to Penal Code 602)
  - If a security officer is out with a known individual who refuses to sign the written trespass notice, the security officer may write “subject refused” in the signature box and sign their name instead.

- Though a written warning is preferred, trespass warnings do not have to be in written format. A video-recorded or verbal warning will suffice for establishing knowledge before issuing a citation so long as the verbal-only warning is documented in a report.
- Once a trespass warning form or the above equivalent option has been completed, please forward it to the Citrus Heights Police Department to be uploaded into their records database so officers and dispatchers know individuals who were previously contacted and issued a trespass warning.

### ONGOING TRESPASSING

- If a known offender who has been issued a written or documented verbal trespass warning is still on your property and you want them cited and removed, call the Citrus Heights Police Department (916) 727-5500 and advise dispatch of the situation. The police department will respond and issue a written citation for violating Penal Code 602(o) or 602(k) or arrest the individual.

### PROSECUTION

- The Chronic Nuisance Offender (CNO) program with CHPD tracks repeat offenders. Once an individual commits five or more municipal code violations, penal code violations, vehicle code violations or health and safety violations over a rolling 12-month period, CHPD consults with the City Attorney. A wrap-around chronic nuisance offender case will be completed and submitted to the City Attorney or the Sacramento County District Attorney's office as a criminal complaint seeking more severe criminal charges for offenders who meet these criteria.

**COMMUNICATION:** I invite all residents to make me aware by email of your security experiences or concerns, and also to make suggestions for enhancing the appearance and function of our neighborhood. Speaking to myself as well as anyone else that has their name on a garden space. Let's

remember that this is a community garden and if you plan to keep your garden space reserved for your use, you have a responsibility to keep it groomed. That means keep the weeds and neatness of your space in check please. If you are not prepared to do this or have someone do it for you, please be respectful and give up your space so it can be reassigned to someone else.

Also, the gardeners do appreciate your large pieces of cardboard (devoid of staples and tape please) and dry leaves or shredded paper in garbage bags and any other tools, materials to fix up and maintain their garden space. There is NO ONE who keeps this community space in order so please deposit your contributions orderly and neat and covered so as not to encourage rodents. There are tools there in this one space only, that can be used and shared when needed.
