Sometimes our silly doctors prescribe medications that warn us to layoff the booze. Usually, the side-effect tends to put you to sleep, and we don't want any sleepwalking done around

here, right? So, here we are a cool bar with all the cool drinks and great appetizers, and you've been warned, booze = bad. Perhaps some of you might not be aware that Shenanigans does offer non-alcoholic beverages beyond a can of Coke or 7UPplus we do have O'Doul's Beer as well. But we can do more than that for you, many cocktails can be made without the booze, we affectionately call them "virgin cocktails." Some of you might be motivated to call them "mock cocktails," either way, ask to have one made for you if you wish. Now if you are looking for nonalcoholic vodka or rum, you might want to rethink that one.

There's this nagging thing I deal with every year around this time; besides a Margarita, frozen or on the rocks, a Tequila Sunrise cocktail, or some Mexican imported beers, isn't there something new and exciting to talk about that doesn't feature tequila? Okay, what if it's just a new idea for a Cinco de Mayo cocktail that features vodka instead. Yup, there is, well if you go looking for one like I did, there are a lot of them hidden out there. So, I picked the following one for this column. It's called a **Tomatillo Green Bloody Mary**! Okay, I can hear you, so stop saying yuck! I have already done enough of that for you already, but I still plan on telling you about it, I'm funny that way. I bet there's at least one person who is willing and game to try it out; if so let me know, it can be our little secret.

You know, there's a lot of parts to this one, so don't go asking Gus to make it or he might leave for vacation sooner than planned. Although this recipe makes two cocktails, it could certainly be elevated to a party recipe if you are so disposed to throwing your own Cinco de Mayo or Mexican themed party this summer. I'll list the ingredients first, you might want to take copious notes, just saying.

- 1 cup yellow cherry tomatoes, halved.
- 3 tomatillos chopped $(1 \frac{1}{2} \text{ cups}).$
- 1 half green apple chopped.
- 1 jalapeno stemmed and chopped.
- 2 tbsp fresh lime juice
- 1 tbsp prepared horseradish
- 1 sprig of parsley and cilantro
- 1 clove of garlic
- 1 tsp salt and Worcestershire
- 1/2 tsp green hot sauce
- ¹/₄ tsp ground black pepper
- ¹/₄ tsp celery seed 40z vodka

through a sieve, and discard any solids left.
Fill 2 colins glasses with ice and pour 2 oz of vodka &tomato blend into each

glass.

• Add all ingredients

until smooth.

• Strain the mixture

into a blender except

for the vodka, blend

- Season with additional lime juice, horseradish, Worcestershire, and green hot sauce, salt to taste.
- Garnish with lime wedges, cherry tomatoes, and green apple slices. Maybe a sprig of cilantro, too.

Well, that's it for this year's dive into Cinco de Mayo. I will warn you that coming in June will be our big Luau Happy Hour, it's gonna be so big we will add an hour to it, it will now be the **Luau Happy3Hour**. I will of course let you know more about it as we get closer to June. We hope to make this year's Luau the best one yet!

GARDEN NEWS Martha Kelley

Good Day to my Fellow Gardening Pals. First of all, there are still garden plots available! Get over to the management office and get one signed out to you for FREE. If you have a plot and do not plan to use it, PLEASE get to the office and release it for someone else on the



waiting list.

It has been great to see so many milling about getting ready to push your seeds/ seedlings into the ground and

watch them grow. It is such rewarding and therapeutic food for the soul to have a hand at growing food for bodily sustenance. Do say hi when we meet each other in the garden arena.

Some have been asking. The White Fenced Garden plot nearest to the Maintenance Barn is:

- A Composting location 1) one that is in a plastic 3 foot tall & around bin covered with black plastic, 2) One is in a pile on the ground and could be ready now or best for fall planting this year. 3) There is a black composting drum that gets properly fed. Do not add to these piles. They just need to be turned occasionally and left alone. They are "cooking" and will soon be BLACK GOLD. Feel free to give the drum a turn when you visit this plot but no deposits please.
- There are white buckets with garden compost in them to add to your holes as you put your plants into the ground. You may have a bucket and compost in it.

- We have an unending supply of white buckets with lids, so just ask for them by calling me. I don't keep them in the garden plot as it already looks a bit overcrowded. Good for weeds, garden tools, or you can put holes in them and they are great to plant in, etc.
- There are black garbage bags of dry leaves and some that got a bit wet. They are all good as mulch and ground cover to deter weeds.
- There is a stand-up pile of flattened cardboard to add to and anyone may have to put on your garden plot as weed deterrent. As it deteriorates it becomes good mulch for your garden.
- You may continue to bring your kitchen organic waste, egg cartons, dry leaves, and small yard clippings/twigs. These should be put in one of the empty white buckets or leaves inside garbage bags. The clippings and twigs can just be kept in the one space you can see so they will continue to decompose. This must be done to keep the rodents and other animals away.
- Last of all there are white buckets that can be turned into Worm Farms. If you want to start your own Worm Farm for your plot, just give me a call and I will give you some worms to start your colony. They take very little care and create that RICH BLACK GOLD.
- If you aren't sure, please just call and discuss any offering or withdrawal of items from this community plot. I will try to keep signs in the plot to direct you.
- At the utmost in our thoughts about providing our offerings and deposits and use of this space, please keep in mind that we need to keep the space as tidy looking as possible.

IT TAKES A VILLAGE Diane Churchill

Are you interested in helping members of our community in need? Not long ago, it came to my attention that some of our neighbors have had to muddle through debilitating illness or injury without the support of close family or friends to help them with the basic necessities of life. This is an interest check for volunteers who can help out our neighbors when emergencies strike.

This would not be a long-term care commitment; volunteers would sign up to help provide:

- hot meals once a day for no more than two weeks (taking dietary restrictions into account)
- rides to urgent care or doctor's appointments
- help with light cleaning for someone too incapacitated to manage it for themselves.

IN THE BEGINNING Dennis Ford



When I first moved to Lakeview we had a very small publication that was all black and white and stapled in the upper left corner. It had no cover photo, in fact it had no photos at all. The company we used to print the Crier could not do photos. Then Lenora

Paterson was named editor of the Crier. She added the color cover and 3 color ads. In order to afford this we had to buy 2,000 copies of the cover and ads at a time. This was enough for 3 months of the Crier and a new cover 4 times each year. This was a big improvement and we all loved it, but still no photos inside the magazine.

When Lenora moved to Arizona her assistant, Linda Evans became editor.

The association president, Larry Waite, asked if we could put up photos of the people in the park on TV in clubhouse, during what was then called "*Friday Night Frolics*." This worked well, so some of the Crier stories we showed with photos that would have gone in the Crier.

We started looking for another printer, however they were all less than reliable or very much more expensive. We went on a quest to find a printer that had the equipment to do digital photos for the Crier. We also talked to our printer to see what he could do to get photos in the magazine. We were able to come up with a way to put black and white photos in that were much better. Advertisers often wanted photos in their ads. This was better, however many wanted color photos and we still only had the 3 cover color ads and they had to commit to 3 months to get one of the 3 spots.



A resident who was selling printers came to us with this idea: we would print it ourselves and in color with a new cover each month. It was almost the same price we were already paying. However, it came with new problems;

paper and ink were not just hard to find sometimes very hard to find. Someone had to stay with the printing for 2 or 3 days to print our magazine. The clown was our very first monthly cover.

Gradually the price of ink and paper went up and up. In addition, the printer broke down almost monthly. We had a maintenance agreement, but repairs were slow many times which delayed the Crier. The real problem is the resident with the printer was moving and would not be able to continue printing.

We were on the hunt again only now the price had gone way up. We were quoted as high as 3 and 4 time more than we were paying. This would require us to raise prices on all ads. We were not confident our advertisers would stay with us if we raised prices that much.



Linda was telling her son our problem and he had a contact with a very large printer in Sacramento that he used in his business. This is a big printer, so large they buy paper by the roll not reams of paper. Our 550 copies makes us one of their smallest customers. We are so grateful to have found this printer.

The cost is almost half of what we were paying allowing us to keep our prices down in an economy that is constantly going up. Remembering that our advertisers pay 100% of the Crier. this is a service to them and to us. If you need any of the services that are in the Crier please try to use our advertisers.



Someone suggested that we put the Crier online and not print it at all. The problems with that include many of our older citizens are not that computer savvy so they would be left out. Also, this might be fine for many of the residents of Lakeview but not at all ok with the advertisers. They were told that 550 residents would receive a printed copy of their ad each month. So we would lose that revenue.

This new printer solves many of our problems, and makes the Crier self-sufficient.

Moving forward we have a new assistant editor, D'Arcy Hale. She has been helping Linda Evans who fell and hurt her back. We have also been asking people in the park who know Photoshop or Paint or have any other graphics knowledge to do the covers and help with ads and flyers. If you have these skills please let us know -- we can use your help.

It does take lots of volunteers to keep the Crier going: people to write stories, people to assemble the Crier each month, more people to deliver it to each house each month. That is in addition to Linda Evans, Editor, D'Arcy Hale Assistant Editor, Martha Kelly (who collects money from advertisers), Dennis Ford ads and covers. Al Fichera, Terry Whittaker, Char Henderson. Carolyn Zwanziger puts the Criers in bags for delivery, and Scott Hillis who is in charge of assembling the Crier.

This is Lakeview's own and growing magazine, we are proud of it and would like to keep it going.

MOTHER'S DAY AROUND THE WORLD

While versions of Mother's Day are celebrated worldwide, traditions vary depending on the country. In Thailand, for example, Mother's Day is always celebrated in August on the birthday of the current queen, Sirikit.

Another alternate observance of Mother's Day can be found in Ethiopia, where families gather each fall to sing songs and eat a large feast as part of Antrosht, a multi-day celebration honoring motherhood.

In the United States, Mother's Day continues to be celebrated by presenting mothers and other women with gifts and flowers, and it has become one of the biggest holidays for consumer spending. Families also celebrate by giving mothers a day off from activities like cooking or other household chores.

At times, Mother's Day has also been a date for launching political or feminist causes. In 1968 **Coretta Scott King**, wife of **Martin Luther King Jr.**, used Mother's Day to host a march in support of underprivileged women and children. In the 1970s women's groups also used the holiday as a time to highlight the need for equal rights and access to childcare.

THE BIRTHPLACE OF MEMORIAL DAY AND EARLY OBSERVANCES

The **Civil War**, which ended in the spring of 1865, claimed more lives than any conflict in

U.S. history and required the establishment of the country's first national cemeteries.

By the late 1860s, Americans in various towns and cities had begun holding springtime tributes to these countless fallen soldiers, decorating their graves with flowers and reciting prayers.

It is unclear where exactly this tradition originated; numerous different communities may have independently initiated the memorial gatherings. And some records show that one of the earliest Memorial Day commemorations was organized by a group of formerly enslaved people in Charleston, South Carolina less than a month after the Confederacy surrendered in 1865. Nevertheless, in 1966 the federal government declared Waterloo, New York, the official birthplace of Memorial Day.

Waterloo—which first celebrated the day on May 5, 1866—was chosen because it hosted an annual, community-wide event, during which businesses closed and residents decorated the graves of soldiers with flowers and flags.

Did you know? Each year on Memorial Day a national moment of remembrance takes place at 3:00 p.m. local time.

DECORATION DAY

On May 5, 1868, General John A. Logan, leader of an organization for Northern Civil War veterans, called for a nationwide day of remembrance later that month. "The 30th of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet churchyard in the land," he proclaimed.

The date of Decoration Day, as he called it, was chosen because it wasn't the anniversary of any particular battle.

On the first Decoration Day, General James Garfield made a speech at Arlington National Cemetery, and 5,000 participants decorated the graves of the 20,000 Civil War soldiers buried there.

Northern held similar Many states commemorative events and reprised the tradition in subsequent years; by 1890 each one had made Decoration Day an official state holiday. Southern states, on the other hand, continued to honor the dead on separate days until after World War I. Memorial Day, as Decoration Day gradually came to be known, originally honored only those lost while fighting in the Civil War. But during World War I the United States found itself embroiled in another major conflict, and the holiday evolved to commemorate American military personnel who died in all wars.
