This slogan suits Sandy Sellnow, 77, just fine! A long-time member of the Red Hat Society (RHS), she has found friendship and fun. “I belong to two groups now and have a great time. I’ve met wonderful ladies and have found a sisterhood,” says Sandy.

The motto of the RHS is *“Love, Laugh, and Be Happy.”* Its sole purpose is *“to promote fun, friendship, fitness, the freedom to express ourselves in positive ways, and a dedication to the fulfilment of lifelong dreams, gained all through the power of fun.”* In other words, not to act your age!

After teaching for 37 years, Sandy retired as a speech and language pathologist. “Some students had multiple handicaps, most were language delayed; I loved my work. When you see the light in their eyes go on, you see success. It’s a gratifying experience, and I have fantastic memories,” she says.

Her RHS journey began one year after she and her husband of 30 years, Gerry, moved to Lakeview Village in 2005 and Sandy retired. There were four RHS groups in the village at the time, The Crimson Chicks and the Scarlet Chapeaus were two of them.

As she talks about her RHS memories, Sandy’s face shows her love for the groups and the good times.

“I joined the Crimson Chicks in 2006. Each month, we would go to movies, plays, and all types of activities outside of the park. We were sanctioned with the National RHS and got together with other chapters,” she says. “We once went to the National Convention in New Orleans. It was a great experience.”

One of Sandy’s favorite memories at our village was the graduation of Sidney Rasmussen’s daughter from a Pink Hatter to a Red Hatter. “The younger women wore pick and lavender and graduated into wearing red and purple as they became 50 years old. These formalities increased the anticipation and fun.

“I remember that Sydney made scrapbooks, giving us a pictorial history. Once or twice a year we would take the train to San Francisco and walk the Embarcadero and Pier 39. Vacationers from the U.S. and other countries would stop us to take our pictures. Everyone was absolutely fantastic.” We would also go to Old Sacramento, walk around, and spend a lot of money. One time we rented a horse and buggy tour. One of our members had trouble getting up in the buggy so we hoisted her up into the carriage. That led to a lot of laughter and fun. What wonderful memories,” she says.

Husbands were also invited to join the ladies for some activities like horse racing. “They also wore red hats and white shirts. Gerry wore a baseball cap,” says Sandy.

Fun for all! However, the pandemic was to change that. “When the pandemic hit, our village chapters closed. I then joined two other chapters outside of the park.

“I belong to the Red Hat Ya Yas (25 members) and the Ladies With Bling (15 members),” she says.

While Sandy is deeply involved in the RHS, she also sings with the Larks, does water aerobics at California Fitness and belongs to a bowling league. “I love bowling,” Sandy says.

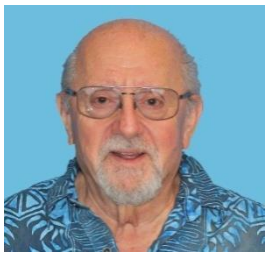
Family is also prominent in her life. “I’m so blessed that Gerry’s children accepted me as their mom. We have two boys, three

Runaway Meatballs

Before sharing this month's recipe, I have a story to tell. We have lots of fun creating menus and cooking for all of you. Some of the things we prepare are cooked in the clubhouse kitchen.

We all cook some food at home, especially if we're using a slow cooker. I decided to do Hawaiian style meatballs. Since they were cooked in a slow cooker, I was working at home the morning of the Luau. I got out my 22-quart electric oven. It can be used as a slow cooker. The recipe was simple, 10 lbs. of frozen meatballs, 6 lbs. canned pineapple chunks, 1 cup pineapple juice, 4 cups of BBQ sauce, 5 bell peppers, and ground ginger. After cooking for 2 hours, it smelled wonderful and tasted better. Time to go to the clubhouse. I lifted the cooker and realized that it was too heavy for me to carry out to my car. I had an idea. I have a small 4-wheeled furniture dolly and ramps from my back door and into my garage. I put the oven on the dolly and guided it down the 1st ramp. Everything was going smoothly. Next was the ramp into my garage. I'd forgotten that it was steep. Started down the ramp, and things quickly got out of control. I couldn't hold onto the dolly, and it sped down the ramp. (I was already figuring out how to replace the meatballs and clean up the mess that was coming.) The meatballs made it to the bottom of the ramp. The lid flew off. Not 1 drop of meatballs or sauce were spilled. I learned 2 things that day. If something is too heavy to lift, get help or use smaller containers. Also, someone was watching over me as I made a dumb decision.

Hawaiian Meatballs

Ingredients

25 frozen, cooked meatballs
1 cup BBQ sauce
1 – 2 red or yellow bell peppers cut into chunks
1 – 15 ounce can pineapple chunks
3 tablespoons reserved pineapple juice
1/4 teaspoon ginger

Directions

Put the meatballs in the bottom of the slow cooker. Pour the BBQ sauce over the top. Add the bell peppers and pineapple juice. Sprinkle with ginger and stir until combined. Cover and cook on high 2 – 3 hours.

Hello all LVV Friends and neighbors: Time for Monthly Household Hazard Waste Collection again in front of the clubhouse on the last Saturday of the month, **August 26th from 11:30 a.m. until noon.**

There is a minor change in our procedure. We now need your address to show the collection site to avoid paying a fee as a business. We will ask for your address so we can continue our service and avoid a fee and/or fine.

BOTTLES AND CANS

July's report is a little down. We only collected \$329 in bottles and cans. It's not bad, but I'm sure if all those who drink from CRV containers

would save and donate them, I would have much better news to report.

Thank you all who donated their bottles and cans to our social committee. A big thank you to Bob Hossack, Tom Nigl, Mark Fagley, Mark and Jodi Reed along with Scott Hillis for collecting the bottles and cans. Thank you to Faye and Diane for helping to sort and inspect all our bags we collected.

I was asked to explain what items are acceptable and not acceptable at the CA state redemption stations in order to receive any money back .Acceptable items are aluminum soda cans, tea, beer, fruit juices or any aluminum container that has the "CA Cash Refund" on the lid. Plastic drinking bottles (soda, water, sport drink, etc), distilled water bottles, gallon water jugs whether clear or opaque we can take. Fruit juice bottle are acceptable as long as it's not 100% juice or over 1/2 gallon. Personal size bottles (12 oz. or less) are OK even if 100% juice. Glass soda, beer, tea is OK. This list of acceptable items is not complete as there are just too many different possibilities to list. Please look at the container to see if it has the CRV, Ca Cash Refund on the label. All these rules and laws are dictated to us.

And in all cases leave the label on the container. The companies will not accept items if they cannot see the CRV on the label. Any item that has contained any type of food is NOT accepted; this includes coffee flavorings, marijuana extract bottles, milk, animal food containers, restaurant plastic serving containers, all steel cans, wine bottles, hard alcohol bottles, and any item that does not have the CRV/CA-Cash Redemption on its label.

When we drive by and collect your donations we try and perform a quick check to see what is in the bags. Sometimes we miss non-CRV items when we take them. This is why we have sort through all the bags looking for the garbage. We must remove all non-CRV bottles and cans before taking the load to the recycling companies. If anything is found not on California's acceptance list at the centers, we will be asked to leave after 4 mistakes. We have filled a 90-gallon recycling trash can back at Lakeview several times this year.

So, the short answer is, if you did not put a deposit down when you bought something, the State will not pay out any money to us. All these rules are not of my making. The State of California and the companies dictate to us what we can and cannot do. Please help us by sorting plastics, aluminum, and glass into separate bags.
