DIANE PERRY



Some people cook because they have to. Diane Perry cooks because she wants to. In fact, she loves to cook. And you love to taste her creations at our Happy 2 Hours.

Now, admit it. While you enjoy Shenanigans feature drinks concocted by Al Fischera, you also come for the themed foods that Diane and her fabulous kitchen staff serve. You've had tasty treats at her baked potato bar, sausages at the Oktoberfest, and specialty dishes at the Cinco DeMayo celebrations.

Diane has always had a passion for cooking. Before moving to Lakeview Village when she

retired as a Library Technician for the Santa Clara County Office of Education for 10 years, she also worked part-time as a caterer.

“My mother and grandmother were excellent cooks. They let me help them when I was 8 years old. I started with baking. My mother allowed mistakes and was patient. She allowed me to learn,” says Diane.

While her mom worked, Diane, 1 of 5 children, did all the cooking for the family. She remembers a cake she once made as a young girl. “I was making a cake and while it was baking, I didn’t think it was tall enough. So, I added more batter on top of the already baking cake. My mom said baking is measurements or you’ll have a baking disaster. Cooking is where you can experiment with ingredients and combinations of flavors,” she says. Her mom was an excellent teacher, training Diane to use only fresh, raw ingredients, creating dishes that look and taste good.

In the Perry household, cooking was a family affair. Diane says her husband and kids all cooked. She remembers, “My husband and my three children are all good cooks. I’ve cooked with all of them, but I also enjoy cooking by myself. I like creating something new like quadruple berry bar cookies with raspberries, strawberries, blueberries, and blackberries. I’ll go online and put together three or four recipes, adding my take to it,” she says. “If one experiment fails, I remember my mother saying, “It’s just the cost of a few dollars’ worth of ingredients and maybe dinner out!”

And she’s always learning. “I subscribe to three cooking magazines each month and read cookbooks. I start with an idea, do research, and try different cooking techniques. There are no new recipes, just changes of someone else’s recipe,” she says.

When the Perrys moved to Lakeview Village, Diane was a fulltime caregiver to her husband

and didn’t have time to become involved in the association. After he passed away, she slowly became involved. “I went to a potluck and joined the Ladies Club with Jane Shore and Beulah Radcliff and soon began cooking for some of their events. I chaired two spaghetti dinners. I also started helping the Social Committee by washing dishes. And helped more and took over when Cindy Johnson went to work,” says Diane.

Now, Diane boasts about how great her kitchen crew is. They are Lori Withers, Co-chair, Cathy Jones, Karen Petersen and Cindi Johnson. “We work so well together. You can’t be a diva in the kitchen. These women are not afraid to tell me when an idea won’t work,” she says.

And sometimes before she lets her crew in on a recipe idea, Diane will try it at home. “I will always try new recipes before serving it to others. I like to stay within my comfort zone,” she says.

Diane’s not only in the kitchen, but she also enjoys gardening, reading, traveling, taking time by herself at the beach. “I like to go to Cayucos and rent a condo and shop in the shops. I’ve also gone up to Bend, Oregon. I also enjoy visiting with my kids,” she says.

She also enjoys living in the village. “We moved here from Santa Clara because we wanted a garage and liked the green spaces, etc.”

If you’d like to start experimenting with cooking, Diane’s advice is to “Get a good comprehensive cookbook. Start by following the recipes and then try different things.” To go further, Diane suggests reading cooking magazines.

And remember. If the recipe doesn't turn out, try again. It’s only the price of ingredients or a dinner out.

GARDEN TIPS

GREAT IDEA! Now that the weather is cooling off, it is time for those Fall/Winter Gardens to get started! There is a list of fall/winter vegetables at: [DigGreenAcres.com/planting calendar](http://DigGreenAcres.com/plantingcalendar) or drop me a text and get a copy from me.

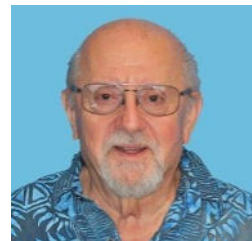
Even if you don't want a Fall/Winter Garden, it is soon time to put your garden plot to bed for next Spring. Feel free to use dry leaves, shredded paper and cardboard from the Community Compost Plot. Plant a ground cover crop or bury or remove your dead plants and weeds, cover with shredded paper and cardboard and find ways to keep the cardboard in place so your plot will not get overrun with weeds thru the winter. Other things you might consider: Starting a worm farm or five of them! Or just a few composting buckets half buried in the ground. It's a place to put your kitchen waste and gives your garden plot some great stuff to make your garden plot more productive next Spring. Go to YouTube.com and there are lots of ideas to make these buckets useful through the winter. Remember we have an unlimited supply so, feel free to take and use them.

NEEDED NOW: Please remember to bring to the Community Compost Plot (the one with the white fence around it next to the Maintenance Shed): **your large pieces of cardboard, shredded paper (not shiny paper), dry yard clippings, small sticks, Toilet paper rolls, paper egg cartons, hair, coffee grounds, fall pumpkins, and Kitchen veggie waste (Not onions or citrus fruit).** Remember all the rules please and keep them contained within a Garbage Bag tied or White bucket with lid on them to deter vermin. Please keep this area neat. It is time to start our large Compost pile, so all these things are needed right now!

As always, we like to stay in touch with our gardeners. So, if you want to, provide your contact information and your garden plot #, my contact information is below. Also, be sure that the Management Office (Christy: (916) 729-0460 knows that you are working your plot through the winter and want to keep it. I usually end this column with a couple of cocktail recipes that are easy to make at home. Well, I do know that vodka is the number one popular spirit at Shenanigans, so, I rounded up a few vodka cocktails that would be easy to prepare at home for yourself or a few friends this year. Of course, there are way too many to put into my column, but I thought these might work for you this year.

Here are some elevated **vodka** cocktail recipes that would be easy to make at home anytime. The first is for Norm and Renee and all their Bocce Ball fans and followed up with the rest of them.

THE BOCCE BALL

3oz Vodka
1oz Amaretto
(Top the glass with Orange Juice and add a splash of Soda Water. Combine with ice.)

ROASTED TOASTED ALMOND

1oz Vodka
1oz Amaretto
1oz Coffee Liqueur (Kahlua)
Milk
(Combine all except the milk in a glass filled with ice. Top up with milk and stir well.)

MINT MARTINI

3/4oz Vodka
1oz Dark Creme de Cacao
1/2oz Light Creme de Menthe

(Combine with ice in a shaker, shake and strain in a glass.)

APPLE CIDER SURPRISE (*In time for your Halloween get togethers.*)

1 1/2 oz Vodka
3oz Apple Juice
3oz Ginger Ale
(Just stir and serve over ice. Couldn't be simpler.)

Antipasto Kabobs

I hope you were lucky enough to get a ticket for the Lakeview Village Association Variety Show on Sunday, September 10. Those who attended saw a talented group of performers. And they were all our friends and neighbors. After the performance the Lakeview kitchen crew served appetizers. Several people asked me to share the recipe for Antipasto Kabobs. This recipe came from the *Taste of Home* website. It's simple and can be prepared 24 hours before serving.

Ingredients

1 package (9 ounces) refrigerated cheese tortellini
40 pimento-stuffed olives
40 large pitted ripe olives
3/4 cup Italian salad dressing
40 thin slices pepperoni
40 thin slices salami

Directions

1. Cook tortellini according to package directions; drain and rinse in cold water. In a large bowl, combine the tortellini, olives, and salad dressing. Toss to coat; cover and refrigerate for 4 hours or overnight.
2. Drain mixture, discarding marinade. For each appetizer, thread a stuffed olive, a folded pepperoni slice, one tortellini, a salami slice that has been folded into quarters, and a ripe olive on a skewer.

Notes

We made some changes to this recipe. We used Kalamata olives. We also threaded each appetizer before we marinated them. (We were making 200+ skewers.) If you use our technique you need to use a shallow layer of dressing in a pan. Don't stack the appetizers or cover them with marinade. Turn the skewers 2 or 3 times to marinate thoroughly.

We used Kirkland stuffed olives, and 5 cheese tortellini from Costco. Sam's Club has packages of thin sliced pepperoni and salami at a reasonable price.

KitchenAid Stand Mixer – We had a KitchenAid stand mixer in the clubhouse kitchen. Unfortunately, it's worn out. We want to replace it. After checking prices, we decided to look for a used one. If you have a KitchenAid mixer you'd like to sell, please let me know. My contact information is at the end of this article.

Kitchen Fundraiser Jam Sales—I'm just getting started making more jam. I plan to have a full selection of jams (including Christmas jam) for the November 8 association meeting. Thank you everyone who donated their bottles and cans. We raised \$511. This is fantastic.

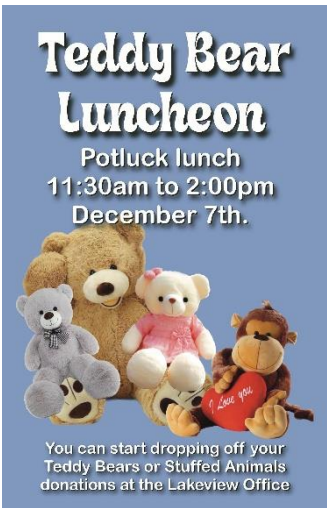

CONGRATULATIONS to the determined "*dissectologists*" (a person who has a passion for solving jigsaw puzzles) who solved the challenges of the beautiful 1,000-piece group puzzle, "Bird's Eye View – Spring Clean Up"! Their labor of love can be viewed on the table to the left inside of the library entrance!



Now that you're inspired, check out the bonanza of new puzzles that have been donated for group or individual enjoyment!

There are whimsical, colorful, seasonal, sports- and animal-themed, and more puzzles ranging from 300 to 2,500 pieces.

The seasons are changing, and so is our library! Fall is rolling in with cooler temperatures, invigorating air, and vivid colors. Library volunteers are active clarifying the location of items in our 2,000+ collection and improving accessibility.

Changes that are underway:

1. Creating a section for LARGE PRINT books;
2. Clearing the bottom shelves in the paperback fiction section (which are unreadable and unreachable to many of us!) and gradually moving books up to the other shelves;
3. Organizing a section for Non-Fiction/Autobiographies/Military books.

Shelves will be relabeled to reflect the changes. Remember that materials do not need to be checked out or returned.
